








I.Q24. What is your overall opinion of Columbia County as a place to do business?











- 66 PCC OMIC is still very new. I'm excited to see how this turns out. Giving our local kids the opportunity to get into the trades is great.

Quality of Transportation Accessibility n=75 I.Q22C. How satisfied are you with the transportation accessibility in your chosen city?





- Availability is difficult because you may be able to purchase it but it may not be able to be permitted. There are a lot of wetlands around Scappoose, which is often a roadblock to properties.



- 66 Businesses in Columbia County (small and large) do a great job of finding synergies and ways to work together.



Res No. 24-16: Contract Approval – WWTP Consor

Contract Administrator Charlotte Baker went over the staff report. At the August 5, 2024 Council meeting, City staff proposed a formal action by Council to approve a task order for construction-phase project management services under the City's existing contract with Consor North America, hereon referred to as Consor, for the Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I Improvement project. Council unanimously voted to authorize the City to move forward with the proposed task order. The scope of the task order, construction-phase project management services, were part of the City's original RFP for this project but were not part of the original scope of the contract with Consor. While waiting for Consor to review the terms of the task order, staff discovered that the initial contract with Consor for design services, which had originally been signed in 2019 and extended, had expired in July 2024, making signing a task order under that contract impossible. As a result, the City will need to enter into a new personal services contract with Consor for Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I construction-phase project management, contract administration, engineering support services As was presented to Council during the August 5 meeting, Consor's fee for these services is \$835,592. Pursuant to the City's local contracting rules, entering into a contract of this amount generally requires a formal procurement process where bids or proposals are solicited. However, because the City Council adopted its local contracting rules by resolution, the City Council can amend the local rules or exempt certain contracts or classes of contracts from the local procurement requirements by resolution, if doing so is consistent with state law. Because of the complex nature of the Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I Improvement project and the various design components, Consor has skills and knowledge that are uniquely required for the provision of the services required. It is vital that Consor remain part of the project for the duration of the construction phase. Consor worked on the design of this project from 2020 until early this year, and only they have the intimate knowledge of their design to effectively perform the project management, construction administration, engineering services, and project close-out support for the City and construction contractors during the construction phase of the project. Because of these unique circumstances, staff recommends the City Council exempt this

personal services contract from the local requirements to seek competitive sealed proposals and instead allow for a direct appointment to Consor. There is no state law that requires a formal process these types of personal services contracts. In summary, in order to move forward and secure project management services for the Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I Improvements project, the City must enter into a new contract. City staff recommends the City Council exempt this contract from local procurement requirements and authorize the City Manager to directly enter into the contract with Consor, Inc. Staff recommends that Council exempt the Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I Construction Phase Project Management Services contract from the local procurement requirements and authorize City Manager Benjamin Burgener to enter the City into a contract with Consor North America to complete the Wastewater Treatment Plant Phase I Construction Phase Project Management Services.

City Manager Burgener explained Charlotte had brought this to him and due to the situation, he wanted to make sure that we are definitely following our own procurement rules and State Laws. He explained in effort to make sure we're being transparent and doing things the right way, even though there was a really small risk in going forward with the contract, it was decided to bring it to the Council, because that's kind of his policy which is it doesn't matter if it's smaller or not. He is all about transparency. He stated it really is, as Charlotte had mentioned, a clerical city procurement issue and that is why we're asking for the exemption for something that was already scoped out and approved. If nothing had changed in it, they could have extended that even though it lapsed.

<u>Councilor Holmes moved, and Councilor Lafrenz seconded the motion that Council approve</u> <u>Resolution No. 24-16 exempting a contract for construction management services from the</u> <u>local procurement requirements and authorizing the City Manager to directly contract with</u> <u>Consor, Inc. Motion passed (6-0). Mayor Backus, aye; Council President Miller, aye; Councilor</u> <u>Santiago, aye; Councilor Holmes, aye; Councilor Lafrenz, aye; and Councilor Jacobs, aye.</u>

Vacation Time Rollover

City Manager Benjamin Burgener went over the staff report. Due to several circumstances this year, including recruiting a new city manager, a few of the department heads and other staff have not been able to easily utilize all the vacation time needed to stay under the personnel manual's annual "use-it or lose-it cap". In general, use-it or lose-it vacation time caps are meant to encourage staff to take needed time off in hopes of increasing overall work/life balance; sometimes this type of policy can become what one performing employee recently described as "a curse". There are other types of policies that can be developed to remove the perception of a curse; however, due to time constraints, those will not be explored at this time. Instead of updating the personnel manual at this time, a one-time waiver or extension of the vacation cap could be utilized to alleviate the stress of these employees to take time off before the end of the year when no vacation is currently desired. No immediate fiscal impact. Vacation utilized

now costs the same as vacation time utilized later. Possible fiscal impact would be realized if an employee were to be terminated with a higher balance during the waiver period if the personnel manual isn't updated to alleviate that concern. Improved end of year employee efficiencies could indirectly improve fiscal impacts. Staff recommends the Council motion to approve the city manager to determine if an employee's accrual beyond their vacation cap is due to extenuating circumstances and to allow for the city manager to grant a temporary extension for their "use-it or lose-it" timeline by up to 6 months, depending on the amount needed to be used by the staff member and their associated workload.

Council President Miller asked if this is a one-time thing, not an ongoing thing, correct?

City Manager Burgener replied correct. He explained there will need to be a specific reason for the rollover request.

Mayor Backus, Council and City Manager Burgener continued the discussion on the vacation time rollover.

<u>Council President Miller moved, and Councilor Santiago seconded the motion that Council</u> <u>authorize City Manager Burgener to make exceptions at his discretion for the City's leave policy</u> <u>as discussed on the record through this fiscal year 2024-2025. Motion passed (6-0). Mayor</u> <u>Backus, aye; Council President Miller, aye; Councilor Santiago, aye; Councilor Holmes, aye;</u> <u>Councilor Lafrenz, aye; and Councilor Jacobs, aye.</u>
