City of Scappoose Park Naming Contest ~ Submission Deadline: December 1, 2017

The City's grant application with Oregon Parks and Recreation, to develop the site located off of Seely Lane as a neighborhood park, was awarded in June 2017. It is anticipated the park will be completed by Summer 2018. Following approval of the Grant, City Council recognized the future park was in need of a name. To that end, the City is now holding a Park Naming Contest and welcomes all members of the Scappoose Community to take part.

Contest Instructions:

- Given the Native Chinook heritage of the area, the City will consider park name suggestions that are reflective of Chinook Indian culture and language. However, all submissions will be given full consideration.
- Please disclose why the park name being proposed should be selected
- Please list your name, phone number, address and email address on your submission
- Submit park name proposals by <u>December 1, 2017</u> either by email to Assistant to City Manager Alexandra Rains at <u>arains@cityofscappoose.org</u>, or by paper submission to City Recorder Susan Reeves at Scappoose City Hall, 33568 E Columbia Ave., Scappoose, OR 97056

Once the submission deadline has passed, the Parks and Recreation Committee will select their top five park name entries. Those five entries will then be presented to City Council, who will make a final decision on the name for the park.

The individual who submitted the winning park name entry will be awarded \$100.



The City is pleased to announce the purchase of a new Mack dump truck. This truck is equipped with a snow plow and sander, and will enable the City to effectively plow City streets during winter events. It also gives the City an important vehicle to help maintain streets and other critical maintenance activities that our outstanding Public Works crew performs for the community on a regular basis.









WHAT IS A STORM DRAIN?

Storm drains are grates with slats that are normally near the edge of a street. These grates collect water from the street to prevent localized flooding in the area. The storm water then flows to the nearest stream or lake. Although not all city streets have a storm drain. Some areas have wet-wells which just hold additional storm water until the ground can absorb it.

WHY SHOULD I HELP CLEAN THE LEAF DEBRIS AND/OR STORM DRAINS ON MY STREET?

Cleaning storm drains or catch basins ensures they work properly to prevent localized flooding in the area. City & county crews work to keep all the storm drains clear, but with thousands of drains in Columbia County, a little help could go a long way and could help reduce property damage caused by localized flooding.

DO NOT BLOW or RAKE LEAVES ONTO THE ROADWAY;

Blowing or raking your leaves onto the street is not permitted. The street sweeper is not able to sweep large piles of leaves as it causes equipment failures & your section of street could be skipped. Leaves on the street could also flow to a STORM DRAIN and clog the drain.

WHAT SHOULD I DO?

- Check storm drain grates frequently to make sure they are free of leaves & debris.
- Do not remove grates from the drain opening this does not unclog the system & creates a hazard.
- Rake leaves & yard debris away from storm drains near your home or business.
- Help keep leaves off the street.

If you noticed severe flooding on your street; call Public Works (503-543-8404).

~ Eastside: Westlane Rd., E. Columbia Ave, North Rd, Bird Rd., Miller Rd. & SE Elm St.

~Westside: Scap-Vern Hwy., Smith Rd., JP West Rd., EM Watts Rd. & Dutch Canyon Rd.

TIPS FOR PROPER LEAF DISPOSAL:

- Dispose leaves in a compost bin
- Order a Waste Management yard-waste container (1-800-808-5901)
- Mulch leaves w/ lawnmower to spread on your garden or flowerbeds for winter nutrients
- Take your leaves to the following locations;
- ~ Columbia County Transfer Station 503-366-2613 (call for rates; avg. truckload = 2-3 yards)
- ~ Scappoose Senior Center @ 33342 SW Meadow Dr. (off SW 4^{th}); will take leaves for FREE as compost on their community garden. But it can only be leaves, --NO grass clippings-- NO garbage-- NO tree trimmings or branches. They also accept soda cans & newspapers in the appropriate bins which helps the Senior Center raise funds.
