# City Council Referred Proposed Local Fuel Tax – Measure 5-275 to the ballot on August 5, 2019. Below is a summary of this Measure.

Why is the tax being presented for voter consideration?

- In 2018, the City conducted a community survey, on which more than 80% of respondents indicated that development and maintenance of streets and sidewalks was important to them
- At the 2019 Town Meeting, the City engaged community members as to the current state of streets and sidewalks in Scappoose – 92% of attendees would favor a proposed local fuel tax over a street utility fee or property tax levy
- The City Council referred a \$0.03 per gallon local fuel tax to the 2019 November ballot

#### If passed, what would funds from the fuel tax be used for?

- Under Oregon law, local fuel taxes can only be used for repair and construction of new and existing streets and street improvements, including sidewalks
- A local fuel tax would be used to fund street paving projects and new sidewalk projects from the City's Transportation System Plan
- A 2017 pavement report update found that the City's average Pavement Condition Index would decrease under existing funding
- If the measure does not pass, no additional funds would be provided for street paving or transportation improvements; no tax would be assessed, and fuel prices would remain the same

### If passed, who would pay the fuel tax?

- All motorists who purchase fuel in the City of Scappoose, unless exempted from fuel taxes by state or federal law
- 30,000 daily vehicle trips experienced through Scappoose on Highway 30
- According to the Oregon Employment Research Division, Scappoose residents account for about 7,000 of the trips

### If passed, what would the cost to residents be?

- The average Scappoose resident that commutes for work in the Portland area drives 40 miles per work day. A proposed \$0.03 per gallon local fuel tax would cost an average of \$1.20 per month at 20 miles per gallon
- The proposed \$0.03 per gallon local fuel tax would cost residents an average of \$1.20 per month. Other options considered included a utility fee option of \$10.00 per month per household, or a property tax levy with an anticipated cost of \$13.00 per month.

### If passed, how would Scappoose compare with other communities?

- More than 20 cities and counties in Oregon have local fuel taxes, including: Washington and Multnomah Counties, Milwaukie, Cornelius, Troutdale, Tigard, Sandy, and Portland
- For example, every gallon of fuel sold in Portland includes a \$0.03 per gallon county fuel tax and a \$0.10 per gallon local fuel tax that go towards maintaining and improving their roads
